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Introduction

Bangladesh is a developing country which has recently been graduated from the LDC. Youth of the country are the key driving force in development. The talents, creativity, merits and initiatives of youth are making crucial contribution to building prosperous Bangladesh. Youth of today are avoiding old ideas and thoughts based on modern science. Youths are of unending strength to translate the dream of Sonar Bangla into action, and to build digitalized Bangladesh. Apart from facing the challenges of the 21st century Department of Youth Development (DYD) has sincerely been working in implementing SDGs 2030 declared by UN, Vision 2041 and Delta Plan 2100 through providing quality training skills, creating employment opportunities and even in building a society free from terrorism, communalism, extremism and drugs. Moreover, DYD has been making relentless efforts to make Bangladesh a developed country by 2041 utilizing our demographic dividend. Our indicators of development journey are making Bangladesh a middle income country, achieving the SDGs by 2030 and turning Bangladesh into a developed, prosperous smart country by 2041. There is no alternative to Department of Youth Development in terms of turning youth sector into a complete technology-based smart one in the form of providing quality training, skill development, creation of employment and even in building a society free from terrorism, communalism, extremism and drugs. Henceforth, it is the need of the day to open up the opportunities for youngsters in terms of education, training, development of talent. Bangladesh is now a country of demographic advantage across the globe. We must have to put priority on technical education for youth by the best use of this demographic dividend and/or youth bulge. Above all, we have no option but to harness the abundant youth power to achieve the goal of “My village My City.”

To make youth responsible, self-confident, self-reliant and to transform them into disciplined productive workforce the Government of Bangladesh created Ministry of Youth and Sports in 1978 which subsequently renamed as Ministry of Youth and Sports. Department of Youth Development (DYD) was created in 1981 to perform field level youth activities.

As per National Youth Policy of Bangladesh, persons in the age group of 18-35 years are considered to be youth. According to the Population Census and Household Survey 2022, total youth population in Bangladesh is 5 core 50 lakh 52 thousand 872 and they constitute about one-third of the country's total population. Keeping this in view, the Department of Youth Development since its inception has been trying relentlessly to transform the promising, productive and job seeking youth force into disciplined, organized and skilled workforce so that they can engage themselves in mainstream development activities of the nation.

It is indeed mentionable that transforming Bangladesh into a digitalized country by 2021, achieving SDGs set by UN and even transforming Bangladesh into a developed prosperous country by 2041, we have no option but to utilize the bulging youth population of the country as main workforce. Since the inception (1981) of DYD until June 2023, it has imparted training to 69,11,112 youths on different trades, with a view to creating employment and self-employment, and out of them 23,82,000 trained youths have engaged themselves in self-employment projects. Amongst these, in the fiscal year (2022-23) 1,46,063 youths have been trained and 45,274 are self-employed. For establishment and extension of self-employment projects since the inception of the microcredit program of the department till June 2023 an amount of Tk. 241662.14 lakh was disbursed to

10,50,819 trained youths as loan from principal capital and revolving fund. Moreover, an amount of Tk. 15308.15 lakh was disbursed to 37,663 trained youths as loan during the fiscal year 2022-2023. The average rate of loan realization is 95.68%. The monthly income of self-employed youth ranges from Tk.6000/- to Tk. 1,00,000/-. But in some cases successful self-employed youth earn more than one lakh taka per month. Moreover, a good number of trained youths have obtained jobs in different organizations at home and abroad by the time. In fact, DYD is going ahead in creating self-employment and employment opportunity across the country.

Our Call

Department of Youth Development (DYD) is working to make the unemployed youth self-reliant and promoting youth entrepreneurs alongside accelerating country's overall development involving the youth in the country's socio-economic development. DYD is making its unceasing endeavors to make ahead the country by using the work-spirit and work stimulation of youth. With these objectives in mind, DYD imparts different productive training skills to youth and gives small-credit facilities on an easy term. DYD has its offices in all districts and sub-districts (upazilas) across the country to implement all these activities. In addition, DYD has residential and non-residential training centers in 64 districts of the country. Moreover, there are mobile training centers in all upazillas of the country. For becoming self-reliant, unemployed youths of the country are receiving a variety of trainings whether short term or long term, residential or non-residential from all these district and upazila level training centers. Many a youth irrespective of male and female does not have ideas about the Department of Youth Development due to the lack of advertisement on activities of DYD. We would like to disseminate information of DYD to all youths- both male and female youths. We implore to those who will read this brochure will kindly inform the activities of DYD to the unemployed youths. - DYD operates huge programs through 64 districts and 491 upazila offices including 10 metropolitan unit thanas.
- To conduct training courses, the Department of Youth Development has 71 Non-Residential Youth Training Centers all over the country and 71 Residential Training Centers in 64 districts of the country of its own.
- The Department has a huge staff of 6316 in revenue sector apart from development budget dedicated to provide service to the youth in terms of their welfare and overall development of the youth.

Programs of the Department

The Department of Youth Development is running the following multifarious programs with the aim of making the youth a human resource by involving them in the national development process in a disciplined and well-organized way, providing proper guidance and imparting knowledge and productive skills:

1.0 Skill Development Training

Department of Youth Development (DYD) conducts two types of training programs:-

1) Institutional training programs, and 2) Non-institutional/mobile training programs, Institutional training programs are of both residential and non-residential. Non-institutional/ mobile training programs are implemented at upazila level according to local felt needs. Duration of institutional training courses is from 1 to 6 months while non-institutional training courses ranging from 7 to 21 days. Mobile Computer training courses are conducted at upazila level through ICT mobile training vans. Youth in the age group of 18-35 years take part in all training programs of DYD. Target of training in the fiscal year 2022-2023 was 1,46,200 and of them 1,46,063 youths were trained. Target of training which is now on-going in the fiscal year 2023-2024 is now 2,42,970 youths.

1.3 Admission Procedure of Training Programmes

Skill development productive training is a regular activity of Department of Youth Development. To transform unemployed youths into skilled human resources DYD has been implementing institutional and non-institutional training programs. Institutional training is provided on residential and non-residential basis.

2.0 Poverty Reduction and Micro-credit Program

Youths live in poverty due to constraint of property. They cannot meet their fundamental needs such as food, cloth, nutrition, health and education because of unemployment and lack of property of their own. The main objective of the poverty reduction program is to ensure a poverty free happy life for them through providing skill development training and micro credit support with easy terms and conditions. This is an ongoing program in all upazilas of the country. Department of Youth Development has three types of credit programs as shown in 2.1 – 2.3.

2.1 Family Based Credit Program

This program benefits the rural landless and poor people, especially the poor youths. The main objective of this program is to help the families develop into units of economic activities. It is being operated in 350 upazilas of the country. This family-oriented approach attaches importance to family cohesion, traditional family occupation, women empowerment, health care, education, environment development and group dynamics. The members of each group are to be blood-related or close neighbors. A group consists of five members and the members are given loan for undertaking income generating activities. 7-10 groups make what we call a center. The employees of DYD make themselves available at this center to disburse and recover loan, thus removing the need of the members travelling to DYD offices. The lowest ceiling of group-based micro-credit is Tk. 12,000 per group member and the highest ceiling is Tk. 20,000. A group is entitled to loan for 3 times. In addition to it, provision of “enterprise loan” has been made for successful recovery of loan to 5 members in a center following the credit manual of self-employment loan. Loan is realized with 5% service charge at a declining rate. Before disbursement of loan, the members are given 5 days orientation on loan management and loan recovery. The average rate of recovery is 96.930%.

2.2 Individual Credit Program

This program is in operation in 501 upazilas of 64 districts (including 10 metropolitan unit thanas). Trained youths are given individual micro-credit to help them start self-employment enterprises. The lowest ceiling of individual micro-credit is Tk. 60,000 and the highest ceiling is Tk. 1,00,000. After expiry of grace period, loan is to be repaid through monthly installments. Loan is realized with 5% service charge at a declining rate. The average rate of realization of loan is 95.02%.

2.3 Entrepreneurship Development Credit Program

Department of Youth Development has introduced a new credit program to enhance self-employed youths into entrepreneur. Primarily this credit program is implementing in 8 divisional districts. An entrepreneur will be provided Tk. 3.50 lac for expansion of income generating enterprise. Loans up

to a maximum of Tk 2 lakh are provided to three persons in each upazila from among the youth who have turned self-employed into entrepreneur.

2.4 Youth loan assistance from other financial institutions

MOUs have been signed with the Employment Bank and NRBC Bank Ltd. to provide loan assistance

to the trained youth who remain outside the loan facilities of the Department or who are unable to implement projects properly due to lack of capital with small amount of loans from the Department of Youth Development. All these banks provide loans from Tk 20 thousand to Tk 10 lakh without collateral.

3.0 Self-employment generation of trained youth

Self-employment enterprise materializes through skill development training, motivation, group formation, credit and input support, close supervision, technical advice and development of marketing network. Trained youth primarily arrange capital from their families to establish self-employment projects for income generation. Later on, Department of Youth Development provides credit support to expand and operate of self-employment projects. Their monthly income ranges from Tk. 6000 to Tk. 1,00,000. In some cases, their monthly income exceeds Tk. 1 lakh. Trained youths may also enter into wage employment in different government and non-government organizations.

Youths are given awareness and motivational training on reproductive health, prevention of HIV/AIDS, STDs, substance abuse, norms & values, gender issues and development, good governance, disaster management, behavioral development, environment conservation, civic education for responsible citizenship, primary health care, autism, protection of terrorism and extremism and social ills.

6.0 National Service Program

National Service Program (NSP) is a high priority program of present Government to fulfill the commitment of Election Manifesto for providing two years' temporary employment to the unemployed youths having educational qualification of HSC or higher. NSP first started as pilot program in three vulnerable districts namely Kurigram, Borguna and Gopalganj in 2009-2010. As per approved NSP operational policy, temporary employments are created for youths in different nation building organizations after completion of three months basic training on ten specific modules. The participants receive Tk. 100/- per day during training and Tk. 200/- while in employment. Under its 2nd phase, the program has been extended to the eight upazilas of Rangpur Division in 2011-2012 fiscal year and under the 3rd phase to the seventeen upazilas of seventeen

poorest districts of the country in 2014-2015. 4th phase has been extended to the twenty upazilas of 7 districts in 2015-2016 and 5 th phase to the twenty four upazilas of 15 districts in 2016-2017 fiscal year. Activities of 6 th and 7 th phases has been extended to the twenty upazilas of 13 districts and twenty upazilas of 14 districts in 2017-2018 fiscal year. Temporary employment of 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th phases and 1st part of the 5 th phase have already completed. In the 8th phase, temporary employment program started in 2020-2021 financial year in 10 upazilas of 10 districts and ended on 31 August/2023. Temporary employment has been created in upazila administration, law and order protection department, schools, colleges, municipalities, union parishads, upazila hospitals, clinics, banks and different service providing government and non-government organizations. From inception to August 2023, a total of 2,35,347 including 56801 persons in the first phase, 14515 persons in the second phase, 16342 persons in the third phase, 26376 persons in the fourth phase, 37268 persons in the fifth phase, 51194 persons in the sixth phase, 27968 persons in the seventh phase and 4,883 persons in the eighth phase. 35,347 persons have been trained and a total of 2,32,966 persons including 56054 persons, 14467 persons, 14803 persons, 26375 persons, 37268 persons, 51194 persons, 27968 persons and 4,837 persons have been provided temporary employment. After completion of two years' temporary employment 12118 were employed in different government and private organizations and 50399 were self-employed. For implementing NSP, the government has allocated Tk. 3366 crore 84 lac while Tk. 3180 crore 82 lac was expended from 2009 to 2020. Allocation was Tk. 663 crore 93 lac 60 thousand in the fiscal year 2019-2020 and expenditure was Tk. 649 crore 49 lac in the same year. Government has allocated Tk. 249 crore 51 lac and expenditure was Tk. 214 crore 60 lac 53 thousand in the year 2020-2021. Tk. 43 crore 79 lac 72 thousand were allocated in the year 2021-2022 and expenditure was Tk. 41 crore 78 lac 37 thousand in the same year. Tk. 33 crore 29 lac 74 thousand were allocated in the year 2022-2023 and expenditure was Tk. 32 crore 40 lac 71 thousand in the same year for NSP. The government plans to gradually expand this program in the form of projects in all districts and upazilas of the country. This program has already created a massive response as an effective strategy for creating employment opportunities for poverty alleviation. The branding work of this program will be started soon to highlight this program beyond the borders of the country.

7.0 Central Human Resource Development Centre

Central Human Resource Development Centre (CHRDC) was established in 1992 at Savar (opposite to bank town) near Dhaka on 5.59 acres of land for providing training to the officers and staff of the Department of Youth Development to enhance their professional skills, capacity and efficiency. It has infrastructural facilities like Administrative-cum-Academic Building, Hostels, Staff Quarters, Officers Quarters and Library. This Centre was established under Upazila Resource Development and Employment Project but at present all activities of it are being implemented under revenue budget. Besides, seminars and workshops are being organized as part of regular program.

9.0 Programs under the Youth Training Centers

The prime objective of the youth training Centers is to impart three months training to the male & female unemployed youths in livestock, poultry, pisciculture and agriculture and motivate them to undertake self-employment projects. They are also taught about primary treatment to protect their dairy, poultry assets. Total number of established residential youth training Centers is 64. Residential youth training Centers are established on 1.50 acres to 7.00 acres of land. All Centers have office cum academic buildings, male and female hostels, officers and staff quarters, duck cum poultry sheds, cow sheds, hatcheries, ponds, nursery units and playground facilities. Until June, 2023 total number of 3,95,536 male & female unemployed youths were trained through youth training Centers. These YTCs can turn into role model for youth training of development if we can use them in full capacity by adding extra pace to their activities.

Ongoing Projects of DYD

10.1 Automobile Driving Training Project

This project has been taken with the aim of creating opportunities for employment and self-employment in the country by creating skilled drivers to drive automobile to prevent road accidents in the country. Trainees from 64 districts can participate in 40 centers under the project. If the project is implemented, 40,000 job-seeking youths and young women will get employment and self-employment opportunities in the country and abroad through training in automobile driving. Since its inauguration, 12,413 youths have been imparted driving training in 8 batches till June, 2023 under the project. Among them, 5,865 got professional license and 1,680 became self-employed.

10.2 Technology Empowerment Center on Wheels for Underprivileged Rural Young People of Bangladesh (TECUYB 2nd Phase)

Technology Empowerment Center on Wheels for Underprivileged Rural Young People of Bangladesh (TECUYB 2 nd Phase) aims to expand computer training facilities to remote village level for the participation of underprivileged poor youth aged 18-35 years in computer training by reducing the skill and information technology gap between urban and rural youth. Under this project, training facilities are being delivered to the doorsteps of the youth through mobile ICT training vans (Minibuses). Each mobile ICT training van has all the modern facilities of computer training including eleven laptops, internet facility, multimedia projector, audio system, and generator. Each mobile ICT training van stays in each upazila for two months and implements the training program. In this way training programs will be implemented in all upazilas (except Sadar Upazila) of each division as per demand. The total estimated cost of the project is Tk. 4618.00 lakhs. The implementation period of the project is 3 (three) years from 01-01-2022 to 31-12-2024. Total target of training is 12880 persons. Project activities are ongoing with 14 ICT training vans. Training/travelling allowance at the rate of Tk.200/- per person per working day is provided to the participants from the project. Apart from this, entertainment of the trainees is provided at the rate of Tk. 100/- per person per working day.

Objective of the Project:

- Creating opportunities to participate in computer training for underprivileged youth in rural areas;
- Creating opportunities for free training by keeping the poor youth in their respective positions;
- Enhancing the competitiveness of rural youth in ICT related jobs;
- Reducing IT knowledge gap between rural and urban youth.
- To provide training opportunities to disabled and backward youth of island areas.

10.3 Integrated Management of Resources for Poverty Alleviation through Comprehensive Technology (IMPACT) Project (3rd Phase - 1st Revised)

One of the objectives of this project is to meet the energy needs by producing biogas at the village level through the utilization of the project surplus of self-employment projects on cattle and poultry rearing. So far 2 phases of the project have been completed. As the 2nd phase of the project has been successfully implemented, the project on the 3rd phase has started. The duration of the project is from 01-07-2021 to 30-06-2024. The estimated cost of the project is Tk.23600.00 lakhs. Accordingly, the activities of this environmentally friendly project are ongoing in the 3rd phase in

492 upazilas of all the districts of the country. A total of 32,000 biogas plants will be set up during the project period to meet the fuel demand. 4332 people have been trained at field level and 784 biogas plants have been set up till August/2023. The establishment of these biogas plants will greatly improve the local environment.

4. Establishment of Youth Training and Recreation Centers at Upazila level.
5. Promoting youth entrepreneurship through capacity building training.
6. Establishment of online based Virtual Training Centers. Estimated cost of all proposed projects were more than 25.00 crore.

12.6 Support to Develop National Plan of Action for Implementation of National Youth Policy & Youth Development Index.

The project has been implemented at Jamalpur, Barisal, Borguna, Patuakhali and Bogura districts with financial assistance of UNFPA under 9th Country Program. Prime aim of this project was to develop a National Action Plan and Youth Development Index for the implementation of National Youth Policy. Plan of Action for implementation of National Youth Policy and Youth Development Index have already been developed. Another aim was to strengthen the capacity of the Department of Youth Development for life-skill education for youth and change the behavior & outlook of the gatekeepers of families, societies and stakeholders regarding life-skill for youth specially for young women. The project implemented by the Department of Youth Development with the cooperation of ILO Bangladesh will provide support to the existing institutional and non-institutional training trades of the Department with training materials and other activities with youth aged 18 to 35 years at all upazila levels of Cox's Bazar district. By creating opportunities for young women from remote areas to participate in various trainings on a priority basis, it will make them self-reliant, become assets and establish them in a respectable position in the society. The project will be implemented from June 2023 to November 2025. The project has been approved in ECNEC meeting. Total Project Cost is Tk. 17688.00 Lakh and operations will start this year.

13.2 Feasibility Study for New Projects of DYD

Investment projects need to be evaluated for various reasons. The estimated cost of all the proposed projects is above Tk. 25.00 crores. Feasibility verification is required to take necessary steps to implement the project as per the existing laws of the government. A feasibility study is required to determine the viability of an idea i.e. whether the project is financially and technically viable and at the same time economically viable or not. In this regard, the Department of Youth Development will verify the feasibility of its proposed 4 projects by BIDS, a well-known government research institute. The following 4 projects of the Department of Youth Development will be implemented through the consulting organization, together or separately, after determining the feasibility and rationality of the projects. It will also help in the implementation of new projects in the future. The project has been approved by ECNEC meeting. Project Duration July 2023 to June 2026 and Total Project Cost is Tk. 498.00 Lakh. Operations will start this year itself.

- Project to strengthen activities of youth organizations;
- National Service project;
- Recreational activities and awareness raising projects through youth organizations to prevent youth from drug addiction;
- Establishment of Deputy Director Office of Youth Development Department in eight districts.

13.3 Training activities strengthening project in the upazila level to create employment and self-employment (2nd phase)

According to the decision of the review meeting held on 21/06/2022, regarding the formulation of the DPP of the project a decision was taken to implement a single project by coordinating 03 projects titled: 1) Strengthening Upazila Level Training Program to Create Employment and Self-Reliance (2nd Phase) Project, 2) Employment Creation and Poverty Reduction for Youth in Villages Project and, 3) Youth Capacity Building Training for Youth Entrepreneurship for better Service.

Aims and objectives of the project:

- a) To create skilled human resources by providing skill-enhancing training to unemployed youth according to local needs for achieving SDG targets;
- b) To reduce unemployment and poverty in the country by engaging the trained youth in self-employment;
- c) Involve other members of the family in income-generating activities through single/joint ventures;
- d) Involvement of youth in nation building activities.

Target:

- The project is for the period from 01 January 2023 to 31 December 2025
- The project will be implemented at an estimated cost of Tk.31554.00 lakhs.
- Providing training to 4,38,750 people during the project period.
- To engage 2,19,375 people in self-employment during the project period.

13.4 Capacity building of Department of Youth Development to impart IT training in 64 districts (Phase 2) project

This project was designed with the aim of creating opportunities for employment and self-employment among the skilled youth in 10-15 countries, assisting in increasing foreign exchange income and engaging the skilled aspiring youth in computer training. The project was implemented from 01-07-2016 to 30-06-2019 at a cost of Tk.1749.91 lakh. 29,800 youths and young women already gotten computer training. Later, the 1st revision of the project was made for implementation from 01-07-2016 to 30-06-2020 at a cost of Tk.3066.00 lakhs. Later on, the 2nd revision extended the duration of the project up to 30-06-2021 and the estimated expenditure stood at Tk 6100.00 lakhs. Under this project, a total of 76 computer labs including 6 in 6 divisional cities and 70 labs in 64 districts for providing computer science and ICT application training.

Objectives of the Project

- a) Existing 274 technical training centers by providing modern training equipment, parts and materials creating a quality training environment;
- b) To assist in the creation of skilled manpower according to the demands of officials at home and abroad;
- c) To enhance the competitiveness of the trainees in the field of employment;

13.6 Construction of Sheikh Jamal Upazila Youth Training-Recreation Center at Upazila Level (1st Phase) Project

The Government's Election Manifesto-2018 (Youth Development Matters) implementation action plan states-

- Youth training centers will be set up in every upazila. Apart from imparting training in various trades, these centers will be gradually developed as youth employment Centers.

- “For the healthful recreation of the youth, one youth recreation center will be developed in each upazila which will have various indoor games facilities, mini cinema hall, library, multimedia center, literature and culture corner, mini theater etc”.

Sheikh Jamal Upazila Youth Training-Recreation Center Construction Project (1st Phase) was taken up to implement the mentioned action plan.

Aims and objectives of the project:

- To transform unproductive youth into organized, disciplined and productive forces by conducting skill development activities.
- Apart from imparting training in various trades, these centers will be gradually developed as Youth Employment Centers.
- To provide healthful recreation to the youth.
- The project will be implemented for the period from 01/07/2023 to 30/06/2026 and at an estimated cost of Tk.663384.11 lakhs.

13.7 Project for Construction of Youth Training centre with Deputy Director’s office in Gopalganj, Rajshahi, Natore, Narail, Feni, Bhola, Brahmanbaria and Barisal districts

The Deputy Director’s office has been shifted to the youth training center that was constructed at the district level. It is not possible to transfer the Deputy Director’s office to the youth training center those are constructed in the upazilas of Gopalganj, Rajshahi, Natore, Feni, Bhola, Brahmanbaria and Barisal districts. Although the youth training center of Narail district was built at the district headquarters but due to the acquisition of more than half of the land of the youth training center for the purpose of the Padma bridge rail connection project, there is a problem in the implementation of the administrative activities of the center along with the training activities. As a result, the Deputy Director’s office and the training centers under his office in these districts are run on different rental buildings, so there is a problem in coordinating the administrative and training activities and it is not possible to provide the desired services to the youth. In order to overcome the mentioned problem, it has been proposed to construct Deputy Director’s office with training facilities in district headquarters of Gopalganj, Rajshahi, Natore, Narail, Feni, Bhola, Brahmanbaria and Barisal districts.

Aims and objectives of the project:

- To create qualified and skilled human resources of international standards.
- The project will be implemented for the period from 01/07/2023 to 30/06/2026 and at an estimated cost of Tk.25061.00 Lakhs.

13.8 Transforming Youth into Human Resources through Technical Training project

Aims and Objectives of the Project

- a) To create skilled human resources by imparting training in technical trades;
- b) Creating employment and self-employment opportunities for skilled human resources at home and abroad;

The Ministry of Youth and Sports has been requested by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to implement the program for the arrival of 10 youths in Bangladesh for a week-long visit by taking up a project/program funded by the Ministry of Youth and Sports. Implementation period: 1 January 2024 to 31 December 2026. The project will be implemented at an estimated cost of Tk.217.00 lakhs.

Out of which 840 crore 55 lakh 14 thousand taka has been spent. 12 projects have already been completed and 05 projects are ongoing with the said money spent.

OTHER PROGRAMS

(a) National Youth Day

National Youth Day is celebrated on 1st November every year by the decision of the Government of the People's Republic of Bangladesh. Successful male and female youths and youth organizers who made outstanding contribution to self-employment and social services are given National Youth Awards on this day. Up to now the National Youth Awards have been given to 519 successful male and female youths including 58 youth organizers. This year 20 successful self-employees and youth organizers will be awarded the National Youth Award.

(b) International Youth Day

The General Assembly of UN endorsed the recommendation made by the World Conference of Ministers Responsible for Youth (Lisbon, 8-12 August 1998) on 17 December 1999, in its resolution 54/120 that 12 August to be declared as International Youth Day and requested all member countries to observe this day with due importance. Bangladesh since then has been observing International Youth Day on 12 August every year in a befitting manner.

(c) Youth Organization Enlistment

Department of Youth Development is entrusted with the responsibility of involving youth organizations in community development programs. For active participation of youth organizations in the development process, the Department enlists youth organizations. Until June, 2017 a total number of 18,458 youth organizations have been enlisted with the Department.

(d) Youth Clubs Registration

To involve the youth organizations/ clubs in socio-economic development activities by ensuring transparency and accountability of youth organizations "Youth Organizations (Registration & Operation) Act 2015" was passed in the National Parliament on 30-03-2015. For starting the registration "Youth Organizations (Registration & Operation) Rules 2017" has been approved by the authority. Department of Youth Development has started registration of youth organizations/ clubs according the approved rules in July 2017. Until June 2023 a total of 6,437 youth organizations/ clubs have registered in the Department.

(e) Grant-in-Aid for Youth Organizations

To encourage club based activities, government has created a welfare fund in the name of "Youth Welfare Fund". The current seed money of the fund has been increased from 15 crores to 35 (thirty five) crores. Since its inception in 1985 to June 2023 an amount of Tk. 31 crores 44 lakh 26 thousand has been sanctioned to 15,568 youth clubs/ organizations. In addition, a sum of Tk. 1 crore 85 lakh 79 thousand has also been sanctioned against 2536 youth organizations as grant from Revenue Budget. From 2009-2010 to 2022-2023 fiscal year, a total of 09 thousand 07 hundred 04 youth organizations was given taka 26 crores 10 lakh 65 thousand as grant in total from this fund. Besides this, Sheikh Hasina Youth Volunteer Award has been introduced for outstanding contribution in social field. A total of 12 youths have been awarded "Sheikh Hasina Youth Volunteer Award" in 05 categories in the financial year of 2021-2022.

f) National Youth Council

National Youth Council (Structure, Organogram, Work Procedure & Management) Rules, 2021 has been formed to pave the way in empowering youth. In the light of the said rules National Youth Council has already been consisted with 75 members.

(g) Sheikh Hasina Youth Volunteer Award

“Sheikh Hasina Youth Volunteer Award” has been introduced by the name of Honorable Prime Minister for outstanding contribution in social field. 12 youths have been awarded Sheikh Hasina Youth Volunteer Award in the fiscal year 2021-2022 in five different categories.

(h) Commonwealth Youth Program

Department of Youth Development organizes Distance Training Courses, Workshops, Seminars, Youth Exchange Programs in collaboration with Commonwealth Youth Program, Asia Centre. Until now a total number of 76 officers & youth leaders have so far obtained “Diploma in Youth Development Work” from CYP, Asia Centre. Moreover, 99 participants so far obtained “Diploma in Youth Development Work” conducted jointly by Bangladesh Open University and Department of Youth Development under the distance training program of Commonwealth Youth Program, Asia Center.

(i) Relations with other International Agencies

UNDP, UNFPA, ESCAP, ILO, UNESCO, JAICA and KOICA extend their active support to the programs of the Department of Youth Development under the Ministry of Youth & Sports. Already 44 volunteers of JAICA, 50 volunteers of KOICA, 97 volunteers of American Peace core and 46 UNVs have left Bangladesh after completion of their tenure.

(j) National Youth Policy

To combat the challenges of 21th century, Cabinet approved the updated National Youth Policy in 2003 and the ongoing youth programs are being carried out in light of the National Youth Policy. Meanwhile 14 years have passed under the existing National Youth Policy. To cope up with the changing needs of the time formulation of a new National Youth Policy is desired. BYLC, a leading youth training organization, has been entrusted with the responsibility of drafting the new National Youth Policy. For this purpose, BYLC prepare a draft of new National Youth Policy consulting with different youth groups, organized workshops at divisional levels and at different Centers by collecting opinion of cross section of people of the society. The draft of the new National Youth Policy has been uploaded in the website of the Ministry of Youth and Sports and public notices were published in two National Dailies for opinions of people from all stratus of the society. The draft policy was also presented in the meeting of the Standing Committee on the Ministry of Youth & Sports. Lastly a workshop was organized to finalize the draft National Youth Policy with participation of local and international experts. Finally, National Youth Policy 2017 has been approved by the Cabinet.

(k) Commonwealth Award

Eight youth organizers have received Commonwealth Youth Service Award, 7 (seven) youth organizers have received Commonwealth Award for Excellence Youth Work from Bangladesh for their outstanding contributions in self-employment and social service since the introduction of Commonwealth Youth Award by the Commonwealth Youth Program, Asia Centre. One successful self-employed youth has received Pan-Commonwealth Youth Service Award and 3 (three) youth organizers have also received Commonwealth Youth Silver Award for their exemplary contribution in social and community development.

(I) SAARC Youth Award

SAARC Youth Award Scheme was introduced in 1997 and since then 2 (two) successful youth organizers have received SAARC Youth Award for their exemplary contribution in community and social work.

Conclusion

Youths are most energetic, self-confident, creative and productive guiding force of the nation. They have dreams, passions and hopes. They are impatient and dynamic. Their bubbling enthusiasm has to be regulated and utilized by providing an enabling environment. Youth are willing and able to take responsibility for their lives and contribute positively to change society in which they live. Proper guidance and direction can bring them in the forefront of national development so that their potentialities are properly harnessed and they are transformed into valuable human resource. We have no choice but to harness the youth to achieve the UN declared SDGs by 2030 and build a prosperous Bangladesh by 2041. We have no option but to utilize the bulging youth population of the country. The relentless efforts of the Directorate of Youth Development under the supervision of the Ministry of Youth and Sports are continuing towards the desired goal. We believe, the strength of youth is the prosperity of Bangladesh.
